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1. The project will provide:

Purchase of housewares and toys for use in the childcare centre to be opened in New Denver (in Lucerne Elementary Secondary School) in fall of 2020. The purchase of housewares will permit a functioning kitchen and food service for the children attending. The addition of toys will contribute to creating a fun and educational learning opportunity for kids. Attached is a detailed list of housewares proposed for purchase including for example baking dishes, pots and pans, a kettle, a popcorn popper, safety plugs, dish racks, wooden spoons and stainless steel serving dishes. Also attached is a list of toys proposed for purchase including for example toy cars, a wooden food set, tool boxes, a tonka truck, a doll house and furnishings, wood blocks, and puzzles.

2. Organization Mandate:

Not yet developed. Mandate will be something like 'providing quality childcare in the Slokan Valley.'

3. Community objectives the project will work towards are: Cultural , Social , Educational

4. Project will address issues or opportunities pertaining to:

These purchases will contribute to preparations for the grande opening of the new childcare centre in New Denver. While these housewares and toys were considered at the time the initial grant application submitted for establishing the daycare, they weren't eligible for funding through the Ministry of Community and Family Development infrastructure grant. Not taking these funds from the Goat Mountain Kids Society's reserve funds will allow this organization to start off on a strong foot. Not taking these funds from registration or tuition fees will aid in in this child care centre offering families affordable childcare, offering staff appropriate wages, and working toward a balanced budget in its first year of operation.

5. This organization is best to provide this project to the community because:

The Goat Mountain Kids Society has entered a partnership with SD10 which has received grant funding to renovate a room in Lucerne Elementary Secondary School for use as a Child Care Centre. This non-profit is run by a volunteer Board that will be hiring staff and management for the Child Care Centre. This is the structure that will support the new Child Care Centre in New Denver.

Harvest Share connects people who have excess fruit from their backyard fruit trees with those who have the time and energy to harvest it. The usable fruit is shared between homeowners and volunteers and other community initiatives. Windfall and damaged fruit is shared with local livestock owners. When the fruit is almost ready for picking, homeowners call the Harvest Share Coordinator. The coordinator calls volunteers who pick the produce and clean up windfall/damaged fruit. Fruit harvests are divided in half: 1/2 to the pickers, 1/2 to the tree owner. Pickers will clean up windfall and damaged fruit and remove it from the property, arrangements are made with the coordinator to supply local livestock owners with this fruit. The Coordinator is also responsible for loaning orchard ladders and will support residents with temporary electric fence advice.

Harvest Share connects people who have excess fruit from their backyard fruit trees with those who have the time and energy to harvest it. The usable fruit is shared between homeowners and volunteers, the local food bank, and other community initiatives. Windfall and damaged fruit is shared with local livestock owners.

3. Community objectives the project will work towards are: Cultural , Social , Environmental

4. Project will address issues or opportunities pertaining to:

Harvest Share aims to increase food self-reliance, reduce the waste of fruit in our communities, reduce human-wildlife conflicts, increase community education and awareness, and build and strengthen community capacity. The Villages of Silverton and New Denver have an abundance of fruit trees and prior to the launch of Harvest Share much of the fruit was going to waste and contributing to human-wildlife conflict. Harvest Share volunteers harvest between 2000lbs and 5000lbs of fruit each year increasing the amount of fruit going onto shelves for the winter and reducing the non-natural food source available to wildlife passing through. Harvest Share hosts a variety of workshops each year on fruit tree maintenance and fruit preserving. Harvest Share works with WildSafe BC and Grizzly Bear Solutions to host electric fencing workshops on an annual basis. Educational workshops and coordinated picks contribute to raising awareness and strengthening community capacity.

5. This organization is best to provide this project to the community because:

Harvest share is a well established project that has been running since 2008. It is a project many people rely on during the harvest season. The steering committee and coordinator work together to ensure project goals are met, reporting is complete, and that the community benefits as much as possible from the existence of this project. Harvest Share has become a model project in the West Kootenays and the Harvest Share coordinator has mentored 3 other communities (Fauquier, Nakusp, and Harrop/Proctor) in getting similar projects off the ground. Since 2008 Harvest Share has hosted 27 educational workshops and harvested an estimated 15,596kg/34,385lbs of local fruit. Over 300 volunteers including Lucerne Elementary Secondary students and teachers have assisted with these picks on over 50 different properties in Silverton and New Denver. Harvest Share has the experience and systems in place to deliver a reliable, effective project.

Kootenay Boundary Regional Hospital (KBRH) is the designated regional surgical services center for the Kootenay Boundary. Approximately 1400 inpatient surgical cases and 5300 day surgeries are performed each year. There are 6 surgical Operating Rooms (OR), a Surgical Day Care Unit and an Ambulatory Care Unit at KBRH. Urological and ENT surgeries account for 23% of the total annual surgeries performed at KBRH.

Once a vehicle is available to share in our system, we will educate the surrounding residents that there is a vehicle available for rent nearby. All members will have access to vehicles across the region.

Importance to the community:

All basin communities can benefit from our project. Currently, our membership includes many seniors allowing them access to vehicles without the unpredictable expense. We have also partnered with volunteer driver programs to provide access to seniors and children who need to access medical appointments. Additionally, we serve 21 businesses, non-profits and governments allowing them to reduce their program expenses. Another large base of our membership includes the 25-40 year old that use the vehicles as a second car or occasional trips when transit or active transportation is not an options. Finally, we provide trucks and vans, allowing members to use a more economic vehicle for the bulk of their transportation needs and accessing our fleet when needed. The P2P model will allow vehicle owners earn income, incentivizing EV purchases region wide, while KCC ensures they are being maintained in a manner that is fuel efficient and safe for all drivers.

1. The project will provide:

This project will expand KCC™s service to all areas of the Columbia Basin through the scalable Peer to Peer (P2P) model of vehicle sharing. This will allow private vehicle owners to share their own vehicle through our blanket insurance and booking platform while earning income. It will incentivize the purchase and renting of electric vehicles and reduce the need to purchase heavy emission vehicles. This will allow KCC to meet existing service requests with minimal financial risk and expand throughout the region.

This will be achieved by hiring a project coordinator who will develop educational material for Basin residents to understanding the significance of their GHG emissions from vehicle use on our environment. It will allow Basin residence to take action and reduce their community™s emission by either sharing their vehicle or becoming a driving member rather than purchasing additional vehicles such as a truck to gather firewood. Enhancements will be made to our current booking system that will accommodate split billing and regional display of available vehicles for rent. Partnerships with local governments, organizations, ridesharing groups and businesses will be established to market the opportunity across the region. Once a substantial base of share vehicles is formed in the first two years, the project will change people™s behaviors and have long-term contributions to reducing GHG on a regional scale.

2. Organization Mandate:

The Kootenay Carshare Co-operative (KCC) advocates and educates to encourage active transportation and provides its members with accessible, affordable, reliable, low-impact transportation solutions that are alternatives to privately-owned vehicles. At our core we strive to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from transportation of privately-owned vehicles through shared ownership and access to low emission transportation alternatives. KCC believes we have a shared responsibility for healthy communities. We cultivate community engagement through collective ownership, shared action, providing opportunity to participate in democratic decision-making and establishing the framework for participating in the sharing economy.

The project will address mobility restriction issues from lack of Greyhound service and public transit in rural areas while engaging citizens to participate in a shared economy and reducing the overall GHG emission produced. KCC has been approached by many smaller communities including RDCK communities to have our services in their area. These requests have come from regional and city governments, social and environmental groups, and individuals.

Our current model requires significant usage from the membership and has resulted in branches starting and being shut down. The P2P model has been piloted at KCC in the past year and has proven to have minimal financial risk allowing EV™s and specialized ICE (Internal Combustion Engine) vehicles to join the fleet without the capital and maintenance costs.

KCC has been operating as a non-profit cooperative since 2001 serving over 1000 members and 42 organizations/businesses. We are leaders in the rural carsharing movement, consulting with groups in Europe, Africa, South America, Australia and Canada. Our Executive Director wrote a Master Thesis on the Success Factors for Rural Carsharing in the Kootenays. Our board members consist of Jean-Marc Laflamme, who brings experience from 20 years of web marketing and business development in the transportation industry and Alex Thumm, city planner with the City of Nelson who holds a Master of Urban Studies. Our web developer, Kevin Suggitt, has worked on the Kootenay Ridershare site and will integrate our booking system with theirs.

Already nine local governments in the West Kootenays have signed on to support the transition to 100% renewable energy at the community-level by 2050, including the RDCK board which represents the whole RDCK. EcoSociety is working with these local governments to take the next steps to plan and implement this commitment: a regional –municipal joint strategy to map out how we achieve 100% renewable energy by 2050 with implementation milestones, including policies and and carbon pollution reductions targets.
